- (b) whether Go 'ernment have again extended the peac agreement with the Nagas in spite of t ie fact that the Naga hostiles are carryi ig on their activities detrimental to the i iterests of the country; and
  - (c) if so, the reasons therefor ?

THE DEPUTE MINISTER IN THE MINISTRV OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRJ SURENDRA PAL SINGH): (a) The real issue in Nagaland is one of restoring peace and normalcy. The Government )f Nagaland and the Security Forces; re attending to this problem and have :he full support of the Government of Inc ia.

As has been nentioned on many occasions in the pas:, the political problem has already been se tied in i960. Further implementation of :he Agreement reached with the Naga leaders in i960 can be gone into when 1 .w and order is fully restored.

(b) and (c) Ext nsions of the Agreement on Suspensie n of Operations <sub>V</sub>AG SOP) are authorise 1 by the Governor on the basis of his ass ssment of the over all situation in the Si »te. The A.G.S.O.P. has helped in ii proving the climate of peace and inculc .ting a sense of security among peace-lovin; people. It is, however, true that th; Underground Nagas have continued tfl violate the terms of the AGSOP and indulge in lawless activities. The State Government and the Security Forces h; ve been dealing with the situation firml/ and resolutely with the result that tl ere is peace in large areas of Nagaland despite attempts by subversive el ments to disrupt il.

## CLOSURE OF TEXTILE MILLS IN WEST B

(a) whether it is a fact that a large number of textile mills in West Bengal has been closed down recently due to labour trouble;

- (b) if so, the number of such mills closed during the last 3 months and main reasons therefor;
- (c) the total number of workers thrown idle by the closure of these mills; and
- (d) the steps taken by Government so far to settle their affairs ?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF FOREIGN TRADE (CHOWDHARY RAM SEWAK): (a) to (d) All Cotton Textile mills in West Bengal did not work during 1-9-1969 to 9-10-1969 due to a general strike called by Cotton Textile Workers Federation, West Bengal over the question of increase in wages and other demands. The General strike was called off as a result of the Tripartite Agreement of 9th October, 1969. Excepting for this general closure, only one cotton textile mill in West Bengal closed down from 15-10-69 due to losses and financial difficulties. This mill had 2933 workers on roll. The case of this mill is being considered in consultation with the State Government.
