of Parliament. The Ministry of External Affairs have brought this matter to the attention of the Consul General of Democratic People's Republic of Korea.

NAGALANI ISSUE

686. SARDAR HARCHARAN SINGH DUGAL: Will the Minister of EXTERNAL AFFAIRS be pleased to state:

- (a) whether any progress has been achieved to settle the Nagaland issue, and if so, the de ails thereof;
- (b) whether Government have again extended the peac agreement with the Nagas in spite of the fact that the Naga hostiles are carrying on their activities detrimental to the interests of the country; and
 - (c) if so, the reasons therefor?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHR | SURENDRA PAL SINGH): (a) The real issue in Nagaland is one of restoring peace and normaley. The Government of Nagaland and the Security Forces are attending to this problem and have the full support of the Government of India.

As has been nentioned on many occasions in the past, the political problem has already been so tled in 1960. Further implementation of the Agreement reached with the Naga leaders in 1960 can be gone into when law and order is fully restored.

(b) and (c) Extensions of the Agreement on Suspension of Operations (AG SOP) are authorised by the Governor on the basis of his assessment of the over all situation in the State. The A.G.S.O.P. has helped in improving the climate of peace and inculating a sense of security among peace-loving people. It is, however, true that the Underground Nagas have continued to violate the terms of the AGSOP and include in lawless activities. The State Government and the Security Forces have been dealing with the situation firmland resolutely with the result that there is peace in large areas of Nagaland despite attempts by the subversive elements to disrupt it.

CLOSURE OF TEXTILE MILLS IN WEST B_{ENGAL}

687. SARDAR HARCHARAN SINGH DUGAL: Will the Minister of FOREIGN TRADE be plea ed to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that a large number of textile mills in West Bengal has been closed down recently due to labour trouble;
- (b) if so, the number of such mills closed during the last 3 months and main reasons therefor;
- (c) the total number of workers thrown idle by the closure of these mills; and
- (d) the steps taken by Government so far to settle their affairs?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF FOREIGN TRADE (CHOWDHARY RAM SEWAK): (a) to (d) All Cotton Textile mills in West Bengal did not work during 1-9-1969 to 9-10-1969 due to a general strike called by Cotton Textile Workers Federation, West Bengal over the question of increase in wages and other demands. The General strike was called off as a result of the Tripartite Agreement of 9th October, 1969. Excepting for this general closure, only one cotton textile mill in West Bengal closed down from 15-10-69 due to losses and financial difficulties. This mill had 2933 workers on roll. The case of this mill is being considered in consultation with the State Government.
