STATEMENT

- (a) Primary education is a responsibility of State Governments. However, in the first three Five-Year Plans, programmes for the expansion and improvement of primary education were assisted by the Centre in two ways:
 - (i) Centrally-Aided Schemes.—Schemes included in the Plans of the State Governments-known as Centrally-aided Schemes—were eligible for assistance at certain prescribed proportion of the total expenditure incurred on them, subject to the limit of total assistance prescribed for the State Plan; and
 - (ii) Centrally-Sponsored Schemes.— Certain selected schemes for the expansion and improvement of primary education were given assistance under the Cen-

trally-sponsored outside programmes, the State Plans.

The following are some of the important schemes for which Central assistance was given in the past:

- (1) Appointment additional ofteachers:
- (2) Improvement in the remuneration of primary teachers;
- (3) Establishment of State Institutes of Education;
- (4) Establishment of State Institutes of Science Edvication;
- (5) Expansion and improvement Teacher Training Programmes;
- (6) Assistance for Mid-day Meals scheme; and

- (b) All Central assistance to State Five-Year Plans is now given according to a formula adopted by the National Development Council. There are no Centrally-aided or Centrally-sponsored schemes in the Fourth Five-Year Plan in the field of Primary Education. Therefore, there is no earmarked Central assistance for Primary Education in 1969-70 or in the Fourth Five-Year Plan. -
