SURVEY CONDUCTED BY INDIAN COUNCIL FOR CHILD WELFARE

Will the Minister of HEALTH AND FAMILY PLANNING AND WORKS HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state:

(a) whether a recent survey conducted by the Indian Council for Child Welfare has shown that (i) nearly 12,000 children go blind every year due to extreme vitamin 'A' deficiency, (ii) seven out of every 10 children go to bed every night without enough food and (iii) twenty per cent of the school children in India suffer from lack of Vitamin 'B'; and

(b) if so, what steps Government propose to take to overcome these deficiencies?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND FAMILY PLANNING AND WORKS HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT: (DR S CHANDRASEKHAR): (a) No survey has been conducted by the Indian Council of Child Welfare. The reference seems to be to an article published in the Children's Annual—November, 1967—issued by the Council. (i) Serious form of Vitamin 'A' deficiency causing a condition known as keratomalacia, leads to blindness and it is estimated that about 10,000 to 12,000 children go blind every year as a result of this condition. (ii) Precise information is not available. However, it is apparent that many children do not get enough of the right type of food. (iii) Nutrition surveys carried out in different States recently have shown that about 10% to 20% of school children suffer from deficiencies due to lack of Vitamin B.
