Decisions regarding the above papers have been taken from time to time since 1960 onwards. It is not in public interest to disclose the names of these papers.

BHAGAT): (a) Government have seen reports of Presiden Ayub's speech delivered on October 26, in the course of which while criticising India on various matters, he is reported to have referred to India's offer of a 'no war pact' and stated that he would be willing to have such a pact provided it was accompanied by another pact which would define the machinery for solving problems that exist at present or may arise in future between the two countries. It may be recalled that President Ayub Khan had in a broadcast to the Nation on September 1, rejected Prime Minister's offer of a no war pact made on August 15, 1968.
