THE MINISTER OF INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND **COMPANY** AFFAIRS (SHRI FAKHRUDDIN ALI AHMED): (a) Requirements of newsprint during 1968-69 on the basis of restricted demand are estimated at 1,70,000 tonnes.

- (b) Imports of newsprint are of the order of about 1,20,000 tonnes and the indigenous production at present is 30,000 tonnes per annum. In addition, 20,000 tonnes of white printing paper are released every year for use by Newspapers.
- (c) The following are the measures taken to increase the indigenous pro -duction of newsprint: -
 - (i) The capacity of Nepa Mills, the only newsprint Mill in the country, is being increased from 30,000 tonnes to 75,000 tonnes per annum.
 - (ii) A feasibility Report for the establishment of newsprint mill in the public sector has been prepared and is under consideration of Government.
 - (iii) A Newsprint mill in Himachal Pradesh is also proposed to be established, in private sector.

IMPORT OF MEAT

- 221. SHRI N. R. MUNISWAMY: Will the Minister of COMMERCE be pleased to state:
- (a) the reasons for the import of meat when the same could be had in abundance in the country; and
