## STATEMENT

Reports of cases of harassment of Hindus living in East-Pakistan and of extortion of illegal gratification, particularly from migrants proceeding to India, by Pakistan police have been reaching the Government of from time to time. There has, however, been no indication of increase in the number of such cases in the last few months.

The Government of India have repeatedly represented to the Government of East-Pakistan about the plight of the minorities there, and have reminded them of their obligations under the Nehru-Liaquat Pact which requires them to guarantee to their minorities security, full freedom and equality of rights. Unfortunately, the Government of Pakistan despite their professions to the contrary, done very little to improve the conditions of the monorities there.]

ANDHRA PRADESH MINISTER'S TALKS WITH U.S. AMBASSADOR

- (b) if so, whether the US. Ambassador had prior discussion with Union Government in the matter; and
- (c) what is Government's reaction to such talks with foreign dignitaries?

THE MINISTER OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI M. C. CHAGLA): (a) to (c) Government have seen some press reports of a meeting between the US. Ambassador and the Agriculture Minister of Andhra Pradesh. The State Government have been requested to let us have the relevant informa-They have promised to do so and the inforamtion is awaited. Until we know the matters discussed we are not in a position to comment fur-In general, there is nothing improper in foreign envoys meeting State Government dignitaries though any agreements with foreign Governments can only be negotiated through the Government of India

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF ETERNAL **FAIRS** (SHRI SURENDRA PAL SINGH): (a) and (b) Some friends of India in the Lebanon, under the patronage of President Charles Helou, had organised an Indian Day Campaign in July 1966 as a gesture friendship and solidarity with India. Contributions in cash and kind received from people from different walks of life. The total collection was £168,000 (Rs. 4 lakhs). The Secretary-General of the Executive Committee of the India Day paign, gave a formal communication to the Prime Minister intimating that this amount was being credited for use by India.

CHINESE CLAIM ON CHINESE-SIKKIM TERRITORY

\*313, SARDAR RAM SINGH: Will Minister of EXTERNAL AF-FAIRS be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that the Government of China have recently sent a protest note alleging intrusion of Indian defence personnel recently in the Chinese territory on the Sikkim borders;
- (b) whether the Sikkim territory is claimed by the Chinese as their own; and
- (c) if so, whether the Government of India have taken any steps to refute the Chinese claim?

THE MINISTER OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI M. C. CHAGLA) (a) Yes, Sir. They have alleged that troops recently constructed Indian seven stone piles on the Chinese side of Kailu La on the Tibet-Sikkim border.

- (b) The Chinese have not in their note given the exact location of this area; Kailu La however appears to be the Chinese name for Kongra La. It is a fact that there are some stone piles well within the Sikkim side of the border at Kongra La. Thev have been there for a long time. The allegation, therefore, that the stone piles are within the Chinese territory amounts to a claim on a part of Sik kim territory.
- (c) A reply to the Chinese protest note rejecting this false allegation vill be sent shortly.

SIKH PILGRIMS TO PANJA SAHIB

\*314. SHRI N. R. MUNISWAMY: SHRI T. PANDE:

Will the Minister of EXTERNAL AFFAIRS be pleased to state.

- (a) whether it is a fact that Sikh pilgrims were harassed by Pakistani officials when they visited Panja Sahib on the occasion of Baisakhi in April, 1967; and
- (b) if so, what action was taken by Government in this regard?

THE MINISTER OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRI M. C. CHAGLA): (a) and (b) The pilgrims who visited Panja Sahib in West Pakistan on the occasion of Vaisakhi in April this year faced some difficulties were primarily a result of lack unified leadership among various pilgrim fixed for them. According to the leaders of some religious organisations who took part in the Vaisakhi pilgrimage, the attitude of some of the officials in Pakistan was not very 'I'he Government are exanelpful. mining the difficulties faced by pilgrims with the object of streamlining the procedures involved.
