AID TO SINGAPORE, KENYA AND
MALAYSIA

STATEMENT

The following is the assistance offered by India to Singapore, Kenya and Malaysia during the years 1965—67.

Singapore.—Training places were provided in India for 12 personnel from Singapore and the services of 1 expert was made available. A gift of 1 Pushpak aircraft manufactured by H.A.L. was announced by the Foreign Minister during his visit to Singapore in May, 1967.

Kenya.—A credit of Rs. 2.5 crores has been extended to the Government of Kenya for the purchase of railway rolling stock and other railway equipment from India. The specific items to be covered and terms and conditions are under negotiations between the two Governments.

Training places were provided to 82 persons and 5 experts were deputed to Kenya during the period.

Malaysia.—137 nationals of Malaysia were provided training facilities and the services of 4 experts have been made available.

During his visit to Malaysia in May, 1967, the Foreign Minister announced the presentation of 1 Pushpak aircraft and two gliders.
