(b) what is the ex-factory and the market price per quintal;

(c) whether the difference in the prices is not too high and if so, what action do Government propose to take to reduce the same; and

(d) whether the production is sufficient to meet the increasing requirements of the country?

THE MINISTER OF PETROLEUM AND CHEMICALS (SHRI O. V. ALAGESAN): (a) and (b). A statement is laid on the Table of the House.

(c) No reports have been received about the high prices of Soda Ash. It has been declared as an Essential Commodity under the Essential Commodities Act 1955 and State Governments are competent to take appropriate action under the powers delegated to them under the said Act to hold the price line.

(d) Yes, Sir. Current year's production is expected to be just sufficient to meet the country's demand. Fourth Plan production target of 600,000 tonnes which was already been covered by issue of industrial licences and letters of intent aims at self-sufficiency.
