# FRENCH BANKS OFFER FOR ASSISTANCE TO INDIA

\*447. SARDAR RAM SINGH: Will the Minister of FINANCE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that the Chairman of the French Bank stated (*vide* 'The Hindustan Times', dated the 12th October, 1966) recently in Delhi that the Bank was keen to extend its assistance to India for industrialisation; and
  - (b) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE (SHRI SACHINDRA CHAUDHURI): (a) and (b) The Chairman of the Banque National de Paris is reported to have stated in a Press interview that the Bank was keen to extend its assistance in the new field which industrialisation had opened up.

Apart from the Press interview reported as above, no communication has been received by the Government on this subject.

### GOLD SMUGGLING ON INDO-PAK BORDER

\*449. SHRI SURJIT SINGH ATWAL: Will the Minister of FINANCE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that there has been a change in the smuggling of gold on the western side of the Indo-Pakistan border after the last conflict with Pakistan; and
  - (b) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE (SHRi SACHINDRA CHAUDHURI): (a) and (b) From available evidence, it appears that after the last conflict with Pakistan there has been considerable reduction in smuggling across this border. During the period Janu-

ary to August, 1965—43 Kgs. of gold had been seized, while 2 Kgs. of geld was seized on. this border during the period January to September, 1966.

#### INDIAN AID TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES

\*454. SHRI A. P. CHATTERJEE: Will the Minister of FINANCE be pleased to state what is the, policy governing Indian Government's loans or aid to foreign countries.

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE. (SHRI SACHINDRA CHAUDHURI): The policy of the Government is to-be of assistance to friendly countries in Asia and Africa in their efforts towards economic development.

#### RISE IN PRICES AFTER DEVALUATION

- (a) whether it is a fact that there has been heavy increase in the prices of essential and industrial commodities after devaluation;
- (b) if so, to what extent there has been increase in these prices to-date; and
- (c) to what extent the steps taken by Government to check these prices have been successful?

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE (SHRI SACHINDRA CHAUDHURI): (a) to (c) The general level of wholesale prices has shown a rise of 3.7 per cent, since devaluation and up to November 12, 1966, as compared to 7.7 per cent, during the corresponding period last year. A statement showing the price variations for selected commodities is placed on the Table of the House.
