FRENCH BANKS OFFER FOR ASSISTANCE TO INDIA

*447. SARDAR RAM SINGH: Will the Minister of FINANCE be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that the Chairman of the French Bank stated (vide 'The Hindustan Times', dated the 12th October, 1966) recently in Delhi that the Bank was keen to extend its assistance to India for industrialisation; and

(b) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE (SHRI SACHINDRA CHAUDHURI):
(a) and (b) The Chairman of the Banque National de Paris is reported to have stated in a Press interview that the Bank was keen to extend its assistance in the new field which industrialisation had opened up.

Apart from the Press interview reported as above, no communication has been received by the Government on this subject.

GOLD SMUGGLING ON INDO-PAK BORDER

*449. SHRI SURJIT SINGH ATWAL: Will the Minister of FIN-ANCE be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that there has been a change in the smuggling of gold on the western side of the Indo-Pakistan border after the last conflict with Pakistan; and
 - (b) if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE (SHRI SACHINDRA CHAUDHURI):
(a) and (b) From available evidence, it appears that after the last conflict with Pakistan there has been considerable reduction in smuggling across this border. During the period Janu-

ary to August, 1965—43 Kgs. of gold had been seized, while 2 Kgs. of gold was seized on this border during the period January to September, 1966.

INDIAN AID TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE. (SHRI SACHINDRA CHAUDHURI): The policy of the Government is tobe of assistance to friendly countries in Asia and Africa in their efforts towards economic development.

(a) to (c) The general level of wholesale prices has shown a rise of 3.7 per cent. since devaluation and up to November 12, 1966, as compared to 7.7 per cent. during the corresponding period last year. A statement showing the price variations for selected commodities is placed on the Table of the House.
