Shri BHUPESH GUPTA: Mr. Chairman, one question. It seems we are convinced and the hon. lady Minister is quite pleased with the state of affairs . . .

 $\ensuremath{\text{D}_{\text{R}}}.$ SUSHILA NAYAR: I am more than pleased.

Shri BHUPESH GUPTA: All of them have signed the resignation letters which are with their respective organisations and heads . . .

Dr. SUSHILA NAYAR: I do not have them in my hand. I wish I had them.

SHRI BHUPESH GUPTA: I do not wish you had them. But the point is how to prevent these letters from coming into your hands. That is what I am suggesting. Why not have consultations again with them because they have a case? They have prepared a document of their demands which has been summarily rejected. Your Health Ministry did not treat them well when they approached you . . .

DR. SUSHILA NAYAR: No. Sir. He is giving a lecture . . .

SHRI BHUPESH GUPTA: feel like yielding to her. Sir, we are closing this matter in the capital now with the Parliament sitting. There is a dispute and controversy between the Health Ministry and the large bulk of doctors here. I am not giving a is judgment. It not enough for the Ministers to object to our figures and other things. But should there be discontent? Under these circumstances it is not necessary for me to talk to them. They can go and talk to the officers. And, as I have said, if they had the least bit of grace, they would have passed a resolution of gratitude about what has been done for them. Then if there was any point . . .
