

THE MINISTER OF STEEL AND MINES (SHRI N. SANJIVA REDDY): (a) and (b) The possibility of setting up a low temperature carbonisation plant based on Singrauli coal is under examination. Bulk samples of coal have been sent to the Central Fuel Research Institute for laboratory tests. It is too early to state what the final outcome in regard to this project would be.

GEOLOGICAL SURVEY

(a) the basis required for causing a geological survey of a region in a State; and

(b) the regions in each State in which such a survey has been carried out or has been undertaken till now?

REPORT OF ANGLO-AMERICAN CONSORTIUM REGARDING FIFTH STEEL PLANT

Will the Minister of STEEL AND MINES be pleased to state:

(a) whether the report of the Anglo-American consortium regarding the fifth steel plant in the public sector, has been received by Government; and

(b) if so, what are its main recommendations and what decision has been taken thereon?

THE MINISTER OF STEEL AND MINES (SHRI N. SANJIVA REDDY): (a) and (b) Discussions have been held with the members of the Anglo-American Consortium who visited

India recently to explore the possibilities of their assisting in the construction and financing of the fifth steel works in the public sector. It is proposed to request them to consider the feasibility reports already available for different locations and to recommend from amongst them at least two suitable sites where they would be prepared to finance the establishment of a plant, so as to enable the Government of India to take a final decision on the location of a new integrated steel works.

EXPENSES ON AND INCOME FROM THE REST HOUSE AT RAMLING ON THE CENTRAL RAILWAY

284. SHRI U. S. PATIL: Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state:

(a) what were the annual expenses for maintenance of the rest house at Ramling on the Central Railway from 1961 to 1963;

(b) what income was recovered during the period; and

(c) whether there is any proposal under consideration for the supply of water to the rest house?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF RAILWAYS (SHRI SHAM NATH): (a) The average expenses for maintenance of the rest house have been Rs. 1,440 per annum during these three years.

(b) The income for occupation of the rest house is only from the outsiders, as Railway staff occupying the rest house on duty are not required to pay. During the three years under reference the rest house was occupied for 43 days by the outsiders giving a revenue of Rs. 189.

(c) The rest house is at present supplied with water when the rest house is occupied. There is no proposal to modify the present arrangements of water supply.
