Since 1997-98 till 20th July 2000, IAF has lost 54 MIG aircrafts in accidents. The year-wise details are as under:—

1997-98	12
1998-99	18
1999-2000	18
2000-2001	6
TOTAL:	54

21 pilots were killed and 10 were injured in these accidents.

(c) to (e) After each accident, a Court of Inquiry (COI) is conducted to find out the reasons of the accidents and also to suggest remedial measures. Findings of the *Court of Inquiries* reveal that technical defect, human error and bird hit are the three main causes for some of these accidents.

A High Powered Committee on Fighter Aircraft Accidents (COFAA) was constituted under the chairmanship of Scientific Adviser to Raksha Mantri to analyse the causes of accidents which submitted its report in September, 1997. It has made certain recommendations to minimize accident rate. Implementation of these recommendations would involve changes in organizational structure, procedures, training, design, technology *etc.* About 55 out of 84 recommendations have been implemented so far.
