decline as compared to the previous half year; and

(c) what action Government propose to take to arrest smuggling of gold to help save foreign exchange resources?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER IN THE MINISTRY OF FINANCE (SHRI B. R. BHAGAT): (a) The value of gold seized while being smuggled from Pakistan during the period January to the middle of June 1962 was Rs. 1,30,620/-.

(b) There is no indication that the smuggling of gold on the Indo-Pakistan border is on the increase. The amount of gold seized while being smuggled across this border during the last six months has been slightly less than that seized during the pre vious six months;

Government have already (c) adopted various legislative and execu tive measures to combat smuggling. include (i) the systematic These rummaging of suspected vessels and aircraft and patrolling of the coast line and land borders; (ii) the use of scientific instrument called the а 'metal detector' for detecting conceal ed gold; (iii) a Directorate of Reve the Centre to nue Intelligence at consolidate more effectively the antismuggling activities of the various field organisations and (iv) in addi tion to heavy penalties imposed under the Sea Customs Act, which include confiscation of the contraband, the prosecutions in deserving cases so as to render the punishment really de terrent.

It is also proposed to amend the Customs Law suitably so as to enable the customs officials to deal more effectively with smuggling; certain provisions to this end have been included in the Customs Bill, 1962, which was recently introduced in Parliament.

ALLOY AND SPECIAL STEEL PLANT AT DURGAPUR

SHRI SURESH J. DESAI

SHRI J. H. JOSHI:

Will the Minister of STEEL, AND HEAVY INDUSTRIES be pleased to state:

(a) how far the negotiations for the establishment of an Alloy and Special Steel Plant at Durgapur have progressed; 1876

(b) what are the estimates of cost of the project in respect of (i) plant and (ii) land and buildings;

(c) what is the extent of foreign exchange allotted for the Project;

(d) whether negotiaions for the establishment of the Project have been carried on with different parties and competitive terms obtained from them;

(e) when the project will be established and by when it is expected to be completed; and

(f) what will be the capacity of the Project for the production of each kind of steel?

THE MINISTER OF STEEL, AND HEAVY INDUSTRIES (SHRI C. SUBRAMANIAM) : (a) to (d) Invitations for tenders for supply of plant and equipments for the Alloy and Special Steel Plant have been issued. The tenders will be opened on 16-10-62. Terms could be settled finally only thereafter. Meanwhile an upto-date estimate of costs is being made. No special amount of foreign exchange has yet been earmarked for the project, since the sources of supply remain uncertain and will depend upon the outcome of the tender.

(e) The Project is expected to be completed by March 1966.

(f) The capacity 'of production of the plant is as follows: —
