ORAL ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS

CLOCK AT THE NEW DELHI RAILWAY STATION

•384. SHRI ABDUL RAHIM: Will the Minister of RAILWAYS be pleased to state:

(a) whether there are any railway ■tations in the country other than New Delhi where the numerals in the dial of the clocks on the platforms have been changed into Hindi; and

(b) whether Government propose to change the numerals in the dial of the clock at New Delhi Railway Station into the international form of numerals?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER or RAILWAYS (SHRI S. V. RAMASWAMY): <a href="mailto: This information is not readily available.

(b) The Hindi numerals in the dial of the main clock at New Delhi Rail--way Station have already been changed to the international numerals.

SHRI ABDUL RAHIM: May I know, Sir, since when these numerals have been changed?

SHRI S. V. RAMASWAMY: Sir, there was a question in the other House in December, 1960. I think action was taken subsequently. It must have been done a month or so ego.

SHRI DEOKINANDAN NARAYAN: May I know if these clocks on the platforms are meant for ordinary .-people or for educated people only? 1089 RS—1.

SHRI S. V. RAMASWAMY: For all people, Sir.

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SHRI DEOKINANDAN NARAYAN: Then why not have Hindi numerals? Ordinary people understand Hindi numerals better than English numerals.

SHRI S. V. RAMASWAMY: He should not forget, Sir, that there are foreigners also who want to have a look at these clocks.

SHRI ABDUL RAHIM: Does the changing of numerals in the clock at the platform come under the amenities proposed for passengers?

SHRI DEOKINANDAN NARAYAN: How many foreigners come there as compared to Indians?

AN HON. MEMBER: Not all Indians know Hindi.

SHRI B. K. P. SINHA: May I know, Sir, if the policies and actions of Government of India are conditioned by considerations for foreigners or for the large mass of Indian people?
