REDUCTION IN WORKING HOURS IN JUTE MILLS, WEST BENGAL

39. SHRI NIRANJAN SINGH: Will the Minister of COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that the Indian Jute Mills Association unanimously decided that with effect from the 30th January, 1961, the working hours of the jute mills in West Bengal, with more than 200 looms should be temporarily reduced from 45 to 42½ hours per week; and

(b) if so, what is the reason behind this decision and the effect thereof on the employees?

THE MINISTER OF INDUSTRY (SHRI MANUBHAI SHAH): (a) Yes, Sir.

(b) Working hours were reduced so as to regulate the consumption of jute according to the available supplies. The exact effect of this reduction on employees is not known; but this regulated production has prevented large-scale retrenchment of labour.
