EXPENDITURE INCURRED ON THE DALAI LAMA'S TOUR

*271. **SHRI N. C. SEKHAR:** Will the PRIME MINISTER be pleased to state:

(a) the amount spent by Government on the tour of the Dalai Lama in various parts of the country since he left Mussoorie recently; and

(b) what are the other facilities accorded to him during his tour?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS (SHRIMATI LAKSHMI MENON): (a) The figures of actual expenditure are not yet known as the bills from the State Governments and the Railway Board who were requested to make necessary arrangements have not yet been received. However, a sum of Rs. 42,000 was provided on this account.

(b) For rail-Journey, the Railway Board provided an air-conditioned saloon with meals.

For road journey, three cars were provided.

At various places of halt, the State Governments provided accommodation at Government guest houses wherever available, or at suitable hotels elsewhere.

INDUSTRIAL ESTATE IN GREATER BOMBAY

*272. **SHRI V. K. DHAGE:** Will the Minister of COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that Government have been approached by the Bombay Municipality for a loan of about Rs. 2 crores for the purpose of establishing an Industrial Estate in Greater Bombay; and

(b) if so, what action Government have taken in the matter?

THE MINISTER OF INDUSTRY (SHRI MANUBHAI SHAH): (a) and (b) No request has so far been received by the Central Government from Bombay Municipality Corporation for loan for establishment of an Industrial estate in Greater Bombay.

ROAD TRANSPORT PRODUCTIVITY TEAM

*278. **SHRI S. PANIGRAHI:** Will the Minister of COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY be pleased to state:

(a) whether the Road Transport Productivity Team sponsored by the National Productivity Council has submitted its report to Government;

(b) if so, what are its recommendations; and

(c) whether it is a fact that the members of the team made contradictory reports on their arrival in New Delhi on the 22nd January, 1960?

THE MINISTER OF INDUSTRY (SHRI MANUBHAI SHAH): (a) to (c) No, Sir. The team will submit its report to the National Productivity Council.

MARKET SURVEYS ABOUT INDIAN FILMS IN FOREIGN COUNTRIES

*279. **SHRI N. C. SEKHAR:** Will the Minister of INFORMATION AND BROADCASTING be pleased to state:

(a) whether Government have received any reports of markets surveys about Indian films from various countries; and

(b) if so, in which countries Indian films are popular?

THE MINISTER OF INFORMATION AND BROADCASTING (DR. B. V. KESKAR): (a) Indian Trade Missions abroad have been requested to supply information on such matters as are likely to help us in promoting the export of films to various foreign countries. The reports from some of the Missions have been received and reports from others are expected.
