Standards of Weights

Regarding the advantages, I would only suggest to Mr. Saksena to read the paper which has been supplied to him, which brings together all the discussions on the subject, under the editorship of Mr. Pitambar Pant. In short, I will repeat what I said at the introduction stage of the Bill that the pressure on the intellectual labour of teen-aged boys in their arithmetic will be cut by more than half. And in the matter of calculations—because it is based upon the decimal system—it will be easiest and fool-proof, though not knave-proof. What more advantages you want? I could go on if I had to address a propaganda meeting elsewhere. I could go on for hours and hours together. And that is what Mr. Nair has suggested that various agencies will take hundreds of hours in explaining the matter. But to this august House I am merely submitting that the advantages are obvious, because the world has accepted it and the part of the world which has not accepted it, that is, the U.K., is regretting it. And I would submit to Mr. Saksena to read the report of the Committee set up by His Majesty's Government in 1951 on the subject, which will show how anxious they are to change over and how they find that they have missed the bus in not changing it over earlier.

Sir, with these words I commend the Bill for the acceptance of the House.

MR. DEPUTY CHAIRMAN: The question is:

"That the Bill be passed."

SHRI RAJENDRA PRATAP SINHA (Bihar): Is there quorum to pass this Bill?

MR. DEPUTY CHAIRMAN: We will have the quorum.

(Quorum bell rings.)

(After a count) We have the quorum. The question is:

"That the Bill be passed."

The motion was adopted.
