I also heard a similiar complaint that there is some delay in the booking of luggage and also at the terminus where the luggage is to be handed over. We are making arrangements to have these matters expedited.

SHRI S. N. MAZUMDAR: Has the attention of the Government been drawn to the fact, Sir, that the reclining seat which has been provided is reclining only the head a little, but there is no provision for stretching the legs, which means a lot of difficulty for the passengers who have to sit in that condition for the whole of the night?

Shri O. V. ALAGESAN: The hon. Member may have travelled in an aeroplane, and the seat that has been provided in this train is much more comfortable than in an aeroplane, and the fare that is paid is the third class fare, which is perhaps the lowest in the world, plus four pies surcharge per mile. I think this is the greatest comfort that the Railways are providing at cheapest cost.

THE DEPUTY MINISTER FOR HEALTH (SHRIMATI M. CHANDRASEKHAR): (a) Yes.

STATEMENT

Main proposals made by the All India Convention of State Boards and Councils of Indian Medicine are as follows:—

- 1. Formulation of a Central Council of Indian Medicine.
- 2. Setting up of Directorates of Indian Medicine for the Centre and States.
- 3. Laying down of a uniform syllabus of study for All Ayurvedic and Unani colleges in the country.
- 4. Framing of a common code of medical ethics for Ayurvedic and Unani Practitioners.
- 5. Extension of facilities in Indian Systems of Medicine for Government servants under the Contributory Health Scheme and Health Insurance Scheme.
- 6. Establishment of a Central University of Indian Medicine.
- 7. Establishment of a Central Museum.
- 8. Opening of Research Institutes for Ayurvedic and Unani Systems of Medicine in different parts of the country, and
- 9. Opening of Post-Graduate Training Centres in each State.

SHORTAGE OF PRINTED PASSENGER TICKETS

- *183. SHRI J. V. K. VALLABHA-RAO: Will the Minister for RAIL WAYS be pleased to state:
- (a) whether shortage of printed passenger tickets was experienced all over the Railways, or only in certain Railway zones in October 1956; and
- (b) if so, what were the reasons therefor?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER FOR RAILWAYS AND TRANSPORT (SHRI SHAH NAWAZ KHAN): (a) Shortage of printed passenger tickets was experienced at some stations on Southern, North-Eastern, Central, Western and Northern Railways in October, 1956.

(b) This was mainly due to short supply of card ticket blanks by the suppliers and unexpected increases in the demand for passenger tickets at certain stations.

TRAINING OF VILLAGE LEVEL WORKERS

- (b) what village industries are included in the course of their training?

THE MINISTER FOR FOOD AND AGRICULTURE (SHRI A. P. Jain): (a) the subjects taught to the Village Level Workers during the course of their training are:

Agriculture (inclusive of animal husbandry, dairying and veterinary science, horticulture, vegetable farming, plant protection, climatology and

agricultural engineering); Rural Extension Service; health, hygiene and sanitation; social science and adult education; civics; Gram Panchayats; co-operation and village industries.

(b) The village industries included in the syllabus of each Extension Training Centre vary according to the local conditions and the availability of the raw material required for the purpose. Some of the important village industries taught to the trainees are spinning and weaving: mat-weaving; bee-keeping; poultry farming; tanning; soap-making; rope-making; gur-making; working of oil ghanies and preservation of fruit and vegetables.
