(b) Tea cargo is ordinarily shipped through private commercial channels. It is, however, understood that the Indian shipping companies would be satisfied if they are given a 25 per cent. share and that as a result of voluntary cooperation betweeen the interests concerned, this share is likely to be made available to them.

VISIT OF AUSTRALIAN PLASTIC SURGEON

- (a) whether, under the Plan, an Australian Plastic Surgeon has come to India;
- (b) if so, where he is working:
- (c) whether he has trained any Indian doctors in plastic surgery; if so, how many?

THE MINISTER WITHOUT PORTFO-LIO (SHRI V. K. KRISHNA MENON): (a) and (b). No Australian Plastic Surgeon is now in India. Dr. B. K. Rank, an Australian Plastic Surgeon came to India under the Colombo Plan, on the 26th January, 1955, and stayed in India upto the 1st March, 1955.

(c) the training consisted of 20 lectures given on the subject and 33 operations demonstrated by Dr. Rank to groups of post-graduate and under graduate medical students at Calcutta, Nagpur and Delhi. No other training was given by him to individual Indian Doctors.

NATIONAL MARITIME BOARD

- 194. SHRI M VALIULLA: Will the Minister for TRANSPORT be pleased to state:
- (a) whether any proposal to set up a National Maritime Board is under Government's consideration; and
- (b) if so, what are the details of the proposal?
