ORDNANCE FACTORIES NOT PRODUCING CIVILIAN GOODS

*173. SHRI M. VALIULA: Will the Minister for DEFENCE be pleased to state:

(a) the number, names and location of ordnance factories which are not manufacturing civilian goods; and 141 C. S. D. (b) the number of surplus persons, if any, in these factories?

THE DEPUTY MINISTER FOR DEFENCE (SHRI SATISH CHANDRA): (a) The Ordnance Factory, Wadala, is the only factory which is not at present engaged in the manufacture of civilian articles.

(b) Two workmen were surplus in this factory on 1st January 1954. They have since been absorbed in other ordnance factories.

SHRI M. VALIULLA: On the whole in the ordnance factories there are about 1,700 people who are surplus; is it not so, Sir?

SHRI SATISH CHANDRA: 2,541 workers were surplus in the ordnance factories on 1st January 1954 out of whom 234 have since been absorbed

SHRI M. VALIULLA: Are those factories that are manufacturing civilian goods preparing those articles taking the order from the civilian trade or also from other Ministries?

SHRT SATISH CHANDRA: From other Ministries of the Government of India, mainly from the Ministry of Railways; and also from civilian trade.

SHRI M. VALIULLA: Are they preparing industrial explosives, Sir?

SHRI SATISH CHANDRA: We are not manufacturing industrial explosives on a large scale. But I understand that there is a proposal to start a new factory under another Ministry.

SHRI S. N. MAZUMDAR: In view of the fact that a High-power Commission has been appointed to enquire into the possibilities of Defence industries, how can the hon. Deputy Minister definitely say that so many persons were found to be surplus?

SHRI SATISH CHANDRA: From the existing workload, there is at present no work for them and we are trying to absorb gradually as many as possible by securing more orders. The surplus was greater but many of them have been absorbed.
