KHWAJA INAIT ULLAH: "Most of them", I know. Is there any application pending with the Railways of a man who opted provisionally for Pakistan and returned to India within the time limit?

SHRI O. V. ALAGESAN: Yes. there might be some applications pending with the various Railways.

KHWAJA INAIT ULLAH: I wish to know the reason for that. It was four years ago, and what are the reasons for keeping the applications pending? They may be granted or rejected, but why are they pending?

SHRI O. V. ALAGESAN: They may have been calling Tior reports from various States.

KHWAJA INAIT ULLAH: It is now five years, and those petitions are still pending?

SHRI O. V. ALAGESAN: Most of the applications have been disposed of, and most of them have been entertained.

KHWAJA INAIT ULLAH: My question is clear. I wish to know the number of applications which have not been disposed of during these Ave years—not "most" or "some". What is the number?

SHRI O. V. ALAGESAN: The answer is given in (a): we are not able to get the figures, because all of them have not reported to the various Railway Administrations.

MR. CHAIRMAN: He asks about those who have reported.

SHRI O. V. ALAGESAN: I will get the information and supply it.

COCOANUT DISEASES AND PESTS

9. SHRI K. C. GEORGE: (a) Will the Minister for FOOD AND AGRICULTURE be pleased to place on the Table of the Council a report on the working of the various research schemes on control of cocoanut diseases and pests?

(b) What are the results of this research work?

(c) What steps have been taken to make the results of this research available to the cultivators?

THE MINISTER FOR FOOD AND AGRICULTURE (SHRI RAFI AHMED KIDWAI): (a) Investigations on the root and leaf diseases of the cocoanut are carried on at the Central Cocoanut Research Station, Kayangulam in the Travancore-Cochin State. A report on the work done at the Station during 1951-52 is placed on the Table of the Council. [See Appendix IV, Annexure No. 36.]

(b) The following are some of the results so far achieved: (i) Treatment of the Central shoot and the inner whorls of cocoanut palms with Bor deaux mixture or perenox, a copper fungicide, has been found to be effica cious for controlling the leaf disease;

(if) Spraying of all breeding material with a weak solution of Benzene Hexa-chloride has been found to be an effective remedy for killing the grubs of the rhinoceros beetle.

(iii) *Nephantis serinopa* (Cocoanut Caterpillar) is controlled by spraying the palms with 2 per cent. D.D.T.

(iv) Control trials with pyrocone E (combination of pyrethrum and peperinyol butoxide) have been found to be a satisfactory remedy against the red palm weevil.

(v) Investigations into the etiology of the root disease are continuing.

(c) The results of research on control of cocoanut diseases and pests are made available to the cultivators through propaganda, demonstrations, publications in regional languages and radio talks.
