SHRI T. T. KRISHNAMACHARI: It is a matter of language—a distinction the import of which I cannot sufficiently comprehend.

- (b) 8,071 out of those recovered from West Pakistan have been restored to their original families. In the case of 131 of them it has not yet been found possible to trace their relations. Four of them died in camps.
- (c) After restoration to their original families, the recovered women are treated as other refugees for purposes of rehabilitation. The question of expenditure on the rehabilitation of such women only, therefore, does not arise.
