Following the earthquake on 18th September 2011 in Sikkim and other areas, all the resources available at the local, District, State and National were deployed for rescue, relief and response purpose. In addition to the personnel from Army and ITBP already located at different places in the State of Sikkim, ten teams of National Disaster Response Force were also mobilized for rescue, relief and response purpose. Necessary financial and logistic assistance by way of deployment of aircrafts, helicopters, shifting of the people to the safer places, setting up of relief camps, providing gratuitous relief, distribution of essential commodities, dropping of food packets, medical aid, hospitalization of the affected persons were provided in the affected area in coordination with the State and local administration.

For strengthening the response mechanism of the State and other stakeholders, several programmes are underway for capacity development through National Disaster Management Authority, National Disaster Response Force and National Institute for Disaster Management, besides programme being run with the help of International Agencies such as UNDP, USAID etc.
