calculated, on the basis of an assumed requirement of 16 ozs, per head per day, that the State would be deficit to the extent of 23.6 lakh tonnes during 1968. The basis of this calculation has not been accepted by the Government of India.

- (b) The requirement of Government distribution of foodgrains in West Bengal will be mot through Central supplies and local procurement within the State.
- (c) From 1-11-1967 to 31-5-1968 about 2.59 lakh tonnes of rice, including paddy in terms of rice, had been procured in West Bengal.
- (d) The main reasons for the shortfall in procurement in West Bengal have
 - (1) Poorer Áman yield than what was expected earlier;
 - (2) Political troubles affecting enforcement of cordoning in a crucial period by large scale diversion of police to the maintenance of law and order;
 - (3) Litigations and injunctions on a number of levy orders; and
 - (4) High prices of paddy and rice prevailing in the open market.

PAYMENT OF DEARNESS ALLOWANCE TO THE INDUSTRIAL WORKERS

287. SHRI CHITTA BASU: Will the Minister of LABOUR AND REHABILI-TATION be pleased to state:

- (a) whether the recommendations of the Union Government with regard to the payment of dearness allowance to the indust ial workers in accordance with the corrected indices of the cost of living have so far been implemented; and
 - (b) if not, the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF LABOUR AND REHABILITATION (SHRI JAISUKH-LAL HATHI): (a) Government has issued a Resolution dated 29th March, 1968 regarding correction of the linking factors for the cost of living indices for Kanpur, Calcutta, Bangalore and Mysore but they have not made any recommendations therein with regard to payment of dearness allowance to industrial workers in accordance with the corrected indices of cost of living; this is a matter for settlement between the employers and workers.
