2764. SHRI DIPANKAR MUKHERJEE:
SHRIMATI BRINDS KARAT:

Will the Minister of HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that nearly 3 lakh engineering degree/diploma holders did not get employment by the end of 2004;

(b) if not, the exact figures thereof;

(c) whether it is also a fact that nearly 5 lakh students are expected to get engineering degree/diploma in the next 10 years; and

(d) if so, the action plan of AICTE or Government to bridge the gap between demand and supply of engineers?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT (SHRI MD. ALIASHRAF FATMI): (a) to (b) There is no centralized data maintained in this regard.

(c) and (d) According to AICTE, the sanctioned intake for the year 2005-06 in the engineering degree programmes approved by them is about 5 lakhs and for diploma courses 2.5 lakhs. This intake is likely to grow in the coming years. Further, the demand for good engineers is encouraging within the country, particularly, in Information Technology and Manufacturing sectors. The demand for good Indian engineers abroad is also increasing as multinational companies are looking for engineers from India. Similarly, Indian multinationals are looking for engineers for their overseas operation. To enhance the quality of engineers that India produces, Universities/Colleges are giving increasing emphasis on wholesome education and on soft skills.
