Assessment of water quality of Tamiraparani river

- (d) the decision arrived at by Government regarding categorizing the river as non-polluted, polluted, highly polluted etc.?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF ENVIRONMENT, FOREST AND CLIMATE CHANGE (DR. MAHESH SHARMA): (a) to (d) Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) in association with the State Pollution Control Boards monitors the river water quality across the country through a network of monitoring stations on various rivers under the National Water Quality Monitoring Programme (NWQMP). Under this programme, river Tamiraparani is also monitored on monthly basis at different locations. CPCB has informed that on the basis of the monitoring carried out, river Tamiraparani is categorized as polluted in the stretch from Pappankulam to Arumuganeri in Tamil Nadu.
