In the climate change negotiations, India has always been a strong advocate of an ambitious and durable agreement based on the principles of equity and common but differentiated responsibilities. In the run up to the Paris Agreement, India engaged constructively and proactively with developing countries, including BASIC (Brazil, South America, India, China) countries, Like Minded Developing Countries (LMDC) and Group of 77 and China for protecting the interest of developing countries in the new agreement. India has been able to secure its interest in the Paris Agreement.

(f) Recognizing the challenge of Climate Change, the Government is implementing National Action Plan on Climate Change (NAPCC) which has eight missions in specific areas of solar energy, energy efficiency, water, agriculture, Himalayan ecosystem, sustainable habitat, green India and strategic knowledge on climate change. Three of these Missions namely the Missions on solar energy, enhanced energy efficiency and sustainable habitats focus on mitigation, while the rest are focused on adaptation. Thirty two States/Union Territories have prepared State Action Plan on Climate Change (SAPCC) consistent with objectives of NAPCC and taking in to account State's specific issues relating to climate change. The SAPCCs prepared by States/UTs inter alia indicate sector specific and cross sectoral priority action and focus on adaptation of vulnerable areas in their respective jurisdictions.

Funds for increasing forest cover

†790. DR.KIRODI LAL MEENA: Will the Minister of ENVIRONMENT, FOREST AND CLIMATE CHANGE be pleased to state:

- (a) the area of forest cover in hectares in the country and the per centage thereof, State-wise;
 - (b) the national average of forest cover in terms of hectare and per centage;
 - (c) if so, the details thereof;
- (d) details of the funds provided by Government for conservation, development and enrichment of the forests in the States including Rajasthan during the last three years and the current year, scheme-wise, State-wise and year-wise; and
 - (e) the details of achievements made as a result thereof?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF ENVIRONMENT, FOREST AND CLIMATE CHANGE (DR. MAHESH SHARMA): (a) to (c) Forest Survey of India, Dehradun, a subordinate organisation under the Ministry carries out the assessment of forest cover of the country biennially and the findings are published

in India State of Forest Report (ISFR). As per the latest report *i.e.* ISFR-2017, the total forest and tree cover in the country is 8,02,088,00 hectares (forest cover 70827300 hectares, tree cover 9381500 hectares) which is 24.39% of the geographical area of the country. There is an increase of 802100 hectares (forest cover 677800 hectares, tree cover 124300 hectares) of total forest and tree cover compared to that of ISFR-2015. The State/UTs-wise details of forest cover along with percentage as per ISFR-2017 is given in the Statement-I (*See* below).

(d) For conservation, development and enrichment of forest cover in the country, afforestation programmes are being taken up under various Centrally Sponsored Schemes such as National Afforestation Programme (NAP) and Green India Mission (GIM) being implemented by Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change. Afforestation activities are also taken up under various programmes/funding sources such as Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (MGNREGS), Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana (PMKSY) and Compensatory Afforestation Fund.

National Mission for a Green India (GIM) is one of the eight Missions outlined under the National Action Plan on Climate Change. It aims at protecting, restoring and enhancing India's forest cover and responding to Climate Change. GIM activities were started in the Financial Year 2015-16.

National Afforestation Programme (NAP) of the Ministry of Environment and Forests is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme for afforestation and eco-restoration of degraded forests and adjoining areas through people's participation. The State/UTs-wise details of funds released under Compensatory Afforestation Funds, Green India Mission and National Afforestation Programme for the last three years and current year are given in the Statement-II, III and IV respectively (See below).

(e) As a result of various afforestation programme by Central and State Government, the forest and tree cover in the country has increased by 802100 hectares as per ISFR-2017 compared to that of ISFR-2015.

Human animal conflict

- 791. DR. KANWAR DEEP SINGH: Will the Minister of ENVIRONMENT, FOREST AND CLIMATE CHANGE be pleased to state:
- (a) the details regarding rate of decrease in the population of animals and increasing rate of human animal clashes, especially attacks on human beings by elephants, stray dogs and monkeys, etc.;
- (b) whether Government received complaints regarding attack of stray dogs in different parts of the country, if so, the details thereof along with the number of such cases reported during the last three years and the current year; and
- (c) whether guidelines have been issued to deal with monkeys, stray dogs and cattle in the country and about sterilisation of these animals in the country, if so, the details thereof?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF ENVIRONMENT, FOREST AND CLIMATE CHANGE (DR. MAHESH SHARMA): (a) and (b) The Animal Welfare Division of this Ministry does not maintain details regarding rate of decrease in the population of animals and increasing rate of human-animal clash, especially attacks on human beings by elephants, stray dogs and monkeys, etc. Management of wildlife (elephant, monkeys) is the responsibility of the concerned State/UT Governments. However, Project Elephant Division, MoEF&CC has compiled the details regarding the deaths of human beings by elephant attack are given in the Statement (See below).

(c) The Government has enacted the Animal Birth Control (Dogs) Rules, 2001 mandating the responsibility on the local bodies to carry out Animal Birth Control Programme to control street/stray dog population and for prevention of rabies. This Ministry is implementing the Central Sector Scheme of Birth Control and Immunization of stray dogs through Animal Welfare Board of India by providing grant-in-aid to the animal welfare organisations and local bodies for implementing the animal birth control programme.
