### Vacancies of Judges in High Courts

#### 32 SHRI JOHN BRITTAS:

Will the Minister of **LAW AND JUSTICE** be pleased to state:

- a) the details of sanctioned strength and the actual number of Judges in various High Courts, State-wise;
- b) the number of High Court Judges recommended by the Supreme Court collegium for appointment during the last one year; State-wise;
- c) out of such recommendations, the number of Judges finally been appointed and a State-wise break up thereof; and
- d) the time line by which all the remaining recommendations made is expected to be implemented?

(a) to (d): A Statement is laid on the Table of the House.

Statement referred to in reply to parts (a) to (d) of Rajya Sabha Starred Question No.\*32 due for answer on 22.07.2021 regarding "Vacancies of Judges in High Courts"

- (a) to (c): During the last one year i.e. 01.7.2020 to 15.07.2021, the Supreme Court Collegium (SCC) has made 80 recommendations for appointment of Judges in various High Courts, out of which 45 recommendees were appointed by the Government as High Court Judges in various High Courts and the remaining proposals are under various stages of processing with the Government and SCC. The Statement showing the details of Sanctioned Strength, Working Strength of Judges and number of High Court Judges recommended for appointment by the SCC and number of appointments made in various High Courts during 01.07.2020 to 15.07.2021 is at **Annexure**.
- (d): Filling up of vacancies in the High Courts is a continuous, integrated and collaborative process between the Executive and the Judiciary. It requires consultation and approval from various Constitutional Authorities both at the State and Centre level. Hence, the time needed for filling up of vacancies of the Judges in the higher Judiciary cannot be indicated. While every effort is made to fill up the existing vacancies expeditiously, vacancies of Judges in High Courts do keep on arising on account of retirement, resignation or elevation of Judges and also due to increase in the strength of Judges.
