**ONLINE EDUCATION BY STUDENTS OF  
KVs AND AIDED SCHOOLS**

**3056 SHRI K.T.S. TULSI:**

Will the Minister of **Education** be pleased to state:-

- (a) the total number of students, in percentage and number, studying in Kendriya Vidyalayas (KVs) and Central Government aided schools who received online education regularly and received online material sent by schools and that of those having access to smartphones for attending online classes, out of the total number of students enrolled in those schools, State-wise, in the last two academic years of 2020-21 and 2021-22; and
- (b) the details thereof?

**ANSWER**

(a) & (b): Central Government Schools namely Kendriya Vidyalayas (KVs) and Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalayas (JNVs) are under the Department of School Education & Literacy, Ministry of Education and fully funded by the Government of India. Under the Integrated Centrally Sponsored Scheme of Samagra Shiksha, funds are provided to the States & UTs for setting up ICT labs and Smart Classrooms in schools, as per appraisal of the proposals received from the States / UTs in their Annual Work Plan, as per norms of the scheme.

To facilitate online education, a comprehensive initiative called **PM eVIDYA** has been initiated as part of Atma Nirbhar Bharat Abhiyaan on 17th May, 2020, which unifies all efforts related to digital/online/on-air education to enable multi-mode access to education. The initiative includes:

- DIKSHA (one nation, one digital platform) is the nation's digital infrastructure for providing quality e-content for school education in States/UTs and QR coded Energized Textbooks for all grades are available on it.
- One earmarked Swayam Prabha TV channel per class from 1 to 12 (one class, one channel).

- Extensive use of Radio, Community radio and CBSE Podcast- Shiksha Vani.
- Special e-content for visually and hearing impaired developed on Digitally Accessible Information System (DAISY) and in sign language on NIOS website/ YouTube.

Keeping in view the availability of digital infrastructure PRAGYATA Guidelines on Digital Education had been issued on various modes of digital education including online mode that depends more on availability of internet, partially online mode that utilizes the blended approach of digital technology and other offline activities, and offline mode that utilizes television and radio as a major medium of instruction of education. Further, an Alternate Academic Calendar has been prepared for learning solutions including self-assessment for grade 1 to 12 for both children with and without device. Bridge Course Modules have also been developed for bridging the learning gaps of Out of School Children studying in Special Training Centres (STC). Similarly, Students Learning Enhancement Guidelines were released to support learning of children during COVID-19. Guidelines for development of e-content for children with special needs have been released. Guidelines for parent participation in Home-based learning during school closure and beyond have also been released.

All KVs and JNVs across the country are conducting online classes. In order to reach out to students who have limited /no access to online learning, Kendriya Vidyalaya Sangathan (KVS) and Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti (NVS) have taken various measures such as preparing and delivering worksheets and handouts to the students at their homes, making available content material on pen drives, sending Questions and Answers through SMS, besides guided peer learning for students staying in the same locality etc. Community teaching maintaining social distancing is also undertaken.

State / UT-wise number of students enrolled, number of students through online study material and their percentage in KVs & JNVs are at Annexure-I.

Education is in the Concurrent List of the Constitution and the State governments have been advised to act based on the situation prevailing at every place to meet the demands of all students for ensuring continuity of education in the wake of the pandemic. State/UT-wise details of Government Schools and Government aided schools having digital infrastructure are at Annexure-II.
