Setting up of a petrochemical industry in Barauni

† 2064. SHRI VIJAY SINGH YADAV: Will the Minister of CHEMICALS AND FERTILIZERS be pleased to state:

(a) whether Government propose to set up a petrochemical industry in Barauni, Bihar;

(b) if so, by when; and

(c) if not, the reasons therefor?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CHEMICALS AND FERTILIZERS (SHRI SATYA BRATA MOOKHERJEE): (a) to (c) Government

have no proposal to set up a petrochemical industry in Barauni, Bihar. Since the initiation of economic de-regulation, the Government is encouraging private entrepreneurs to set up petrochemical plants using state-of-the-art technology and face the emerging competition.

Export of urea to Nepal

2065. SHRI PREM CHAND GUPTA: Will the Minister of CHEMICALS AND FERTILIZERS be pleased to state:

(a) whether it is a fact that Nepal does not produce fertilizers and imports about 1,80,000 tonnes from Asian and Gulf countries, against a domestic demand of 3,50,000 tonnes, per year;

(b) whether Nepal is offering to give interest subsidies to importers; and

(c) if so, what action Government are taking to increase its export of urea to Nepal?

THE MINISTER OF STATE IN THE MINISTRY OF CHEMICALS AND FERTILIZERS (SHRI SATYA BRATA MOOKHERJEE): (a) Nepal does not produce fertilizers. Its domestic demand is estimated to be 3,50,000 metric tonnes per year. Government does not have information as to how much of its imported from Asian and Gulf countries.

(b) The Government does not have information about Nepal's policies regarding subsidies to importers.

(c) Under the Export-Import Policy of 1997-2002, export of urea is restricted. However Government has permitted export of urea to Nepal from time to time. The exports of urea to Nepal in the last three years have been as under:
