SHIPPING CONTAINER PROBLEMS

787. SHRI JAWHAR SIRCAR:

Will the Minister of PORTS, SHIPPING AND WATERWAYS be pleased to state:

- (a) the latest position regarding the crisis in freight shipping due to the worldwide container shortage crisis;
- (b) the details of month by month increase in rates on the most important routes from India over the last two calendar years;
- (c) the assistance Government has offered to mitigate this crisis that has a ripple effect down the entire supply chains, disrupting country's global trade; and
- (d) the other problems facing country's shipping industry?

ANSWER

MINISTER OF PORTS, SHIPPING AND WATERWAYS (SHRI SARBANANDA SONOWAL)

- (a) to (c) (i) The government has adopted a multi-pronged strategy to allay the problem. The efforts are spearheaded by an inter disciplinary task force which consists of representatives from the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Ministry of Ports Shipping and Waterways, Ministry of Railways, Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC) and stakeholders like the Federation of Indian Export Organizations (FIEO). The task force after considerable stakeholder consultation, is taking coordinated action on identified tracks including pressing additional shipping/container capacity into service including enhanced import of empty containers by shipping lines to the country, improved operational planning by facilitating close coordination between exporters and shipping lines, release of abandoned/detained /seized containers, increasing duty free stay of containers, freight discounts for empty repositioning by Railways, measures to improve the turnaround times of containers through tracking and monitoring of dwell times so as to effectively enhance availability of containers, seeking out possible ways to promote use of bulk/break-bulk movement by exporters as compared to containerized movement wherever feasible.
- (ii) Regular interaction with the Shipping Lines and their association has resulted in increasing the availability of the number of empty imported (TEUs) containers. So far 1.84

million TEUs have been repositioned by shipping lines. New Services to West Africa, USA, Europe and Far East has been started by Shipping Lines further increasing containers supply and availability of space on ships. The SCI has also diverted one 4500 TEUs container ship 'SCI Chennai' engaged in Coastal trade to EXIM trade from 03.10.2021.

- (iii) The Directorate General of Shipping (DGS) had issued an Advisory vide Circular No. 26 of 2021 dated 14.09.2021 to the shipping lines freight forwarders / Non-Vessel Operating Common Carriers (NVOCCs) / Multimodal Transport Operator (MTOs) / Customs House Agent (CHA) operating in India advising not to levy any special priority charges for according any priority to the containers. Shipping lines and freight forwarders / NVOCCs / MTOs / CHAs were also asked to bring this to the attention of the EXIM trade.
- (iv) Government of India is not involved in fixing freight rates and thus, the same is not maintained. However, information as available with Container Shipping Lines Association (India) (CSLA), regarding market rate levels (in USD) of the last two calendar years i.e. January 2020 to December, 2021 is as below.
